The field researches and critiques different societal norms of gender, race, class, sexuality, and other social inequalities.

Women's studies is related to the fields of gender studies, feminist studies, and sexuality studies, and more broadly related to the fields of cultural studies, ethnic studies, and African-American studies. Women's studies courses are now offered in over seven hundred institutions in the United States, and globally in more than forty countries.

Gender and women's studies is an interdisciplinary theoretical academic program which needs to develop general and specified knowledge and skills among the post graduates to engage themselves in social activities. In recent years advances in information and communication technology, liberalization, privatization and globalization there are many issues raised about social life. It has changed the citizens interface with each other. Gender related issues like discrimination in male-female relationship.

All around the world, women are facing threats to their lives, health, and social rights. Moreover, as a result of work outside and at home, they should have a well-recognized level of human rights but many women don't and also not secure enough in society or even in their own family. According to politico women face lots of problems today: Navigating career and motherhood, Shared responsibilities for the care and nurturing of children, Increasing rates of maternal mortality, The lack of respect for care giving, The unfriendly Economic, Not Enough female decision-makers etc.
