PATTERN OF QUESTION PAPER ON THE UNIT SYSTEM

The pattern of question paper as per unit system will be broadly based on the following pattern.

- (1) Syllabus has been divided into units equal to the number of question to be answered in the paper. On each unit there will be a question either a long answer type or a short answer type.
- (2) Number of question will be in accordance with the unit prescribed in the syllabi for each paper i.e. there will be one question on each unit.
- (3) For every question long answer type or short answer type there will be an alternative choice from the same unit. However, there will be no internal choice in a question.
- (4) Division of marks between long answer and short answer type question will be in the ratio of 40 and 60.
- (5) Each short answer type question shall Contain 4 to 8 short sub question with no internal choice.

Whereas, the Govt. of Maharashtra vide its Letter No. NGC-2009/ (169/09)/मशि-४ दिनांक १९.७.२००९ has sanctioned "B.A. in Social Work" degree course to Vidnyan and Grihvidnyan Mahavidyalaya, Chandur Bazar, Distt. Amravati from the session 2010-2011.

AND

Whereas, the Academic Council in its meeting held on 20.2.2010 vide item No. 16(3) D)R-1 has resolved to accept that the syllabi prescribed for B.S.W. Part-I, Part-II & Final shall be applicable for 'B.A. in Social Work' along with the scheme of examinations and other provisions shown in ordinance No. 136.

AND

Whereas, the Management Council in its meeting held on 12.5.2010 vide item No. 188 has approved the recommendation of Academic Council regarding institution of new degree i.e. B.A. in Social Work in the faculty of Social Sciences.

AND

Whereas, the Scheme of Examination & Syllabi are to be made available to the concern for the Academic Session 2010-2011 and onwards.

AND

Whereas, making Ordinance for the degree of Bachelor of Arts in Social Work is time consuming process.

Now therefore, I, Dr. Kamal Singh, Vice-Chancellor, Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University in exercise of the powers conferred upon me under Sub-Section (8) of Section 14 of Maharashtra Universities Act, 1994, do hereby direct as under :-

- 1. This Direction may be called, "Examinations leading to the Degree of Bachelor Arts in Social Work (वाडुःमय स्नातक - समाजकार्य) direction, 2010".
- This direction shall come into force from the Academic Session 2010-2 2011.

- The Examinations leading to the Degree of (वाडः मय रनातक समाजकार्य) Bachelor of Arts in Social Work shall be in the three parts. viz. Part-I called the (वाडः मय स्नातक - समाजकार्य भाग-१) B.A. in Social Work Part-I Examination to be held at the end of the first year, Part-II (वाडःमय स्नातक - समाजकार्य भाग-२) B.A. in Social Work Part-II Examination to be held at the end of the second year and Part-III called the (वाडःमय स्नातक - समाजकार्य अंत्य) B.A. in Social Work Final Examination to be held at the end of the third year.
- The examination for each part shall be held twice a year at such 4. places and on such dates as may be appointed by the Academic Council.
- Subject to his compliance with the provisions of this Direction and 5. of other Ordinances in force from time to time, an applicant for admission to the (वाडःमय स्नातक - समाजकार्य भाग-१) B.A. in Social Work Part-I Examination.
 - Shall have passed not less than one academic year previously (i)
 - The XII Standard Examination of Maharashtra State (a) Board of Secondary & Higher Secondary Education; or the XII Standard Examination of Maharashtra State Board of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education, in Vocational Stream with one Language only; or an examination recognised as equivalent thereto, with English as one of the subjects of passing and with such standards of attainments as may be prescribed; or
 - The examination for Certificate in Social Work of the (b) University; and
 - Shall have prosecuted a regular course of study in a College (ii) or a recognised institution for not less than one academic year.
- 6. An examinee unsuccessful at the intermediate Examination or the Pre-Professional Examination or the (प्रथम वाडुः मय / वाडुः मय रनातक भाग-१) First B.A./B.A.Part-I Examination of the University shall be eligible for admission to the (वाडुःमय स्नातक - समाजकार्य भाग-१) B.A. in Social Work Part-I Examination on prosecuting a regular course of study for not less than one academic year in a College or a recognised Institution.

- 7. An Examinee who has been declared eligible for a compartment at the (पुर्व-विद्यापीठ) Pre-University Examination in accordance with the provisions of the concerned Ordinance shall be eligible for admission to the examination unless he is declared successful at the (पुर्व-विद्यापीठ) Pre-University Examination.
- 8. Subject to his compliance with the provisions of this Direction and of other Ordinances in force from time to time, an applicant for admission to the (वाङ्:मय स्नातक समाजकार्य भाग-२) B.A. in Social Work Part-II Examination :
 - a) Shall have passed the (प्रथम वाङ्ःमय स्नातक समाजकार्य/ वाङ्ःमय स्नातक- समाजकार्य भाग-१) First B.A. in Social Work./B.A. in Social Work Part-I Examination of the University not less than one academic year before his admission to the (वाङ्ःमय स्नातक - समाजकार्य भाग-२) B.A. in Social Work Part-II Examination, and
 - (b) shall have prosecuted a regular course of study for not less than one academic year in a College or recognised Institution.
- 9. Subject to his compliance with the provisions of this Direction and of other Ordinances in force from time to time, an applicant for admission to the (वाड्:मय रनातक समाजकार्य अंत्य) B.A. in Social Work Final Examination.:-
 - (a) shall have passed the (वाड्:मय स्नातक समाजकार्य भाग-२) B.A. in Social Work Part-II Examination of the University not less than one academic year before his admission to the (वाड्:मय स्नातक - समाजकार्य अंत्य) B.A. in Social Work Final Examination; and
 - (b) shall have prosecuted a regular course of study for not less than one Academic year in a College or recognised Institution
- 10. The fee for the examination shall be : -
 - (i) For (वाड्ःमय स्नातक समाजकार्य भाग-१) B.A. in Social Work Part-I Examination Rs. 62/-.
 - (ii) For (वाड्ःमय स्नातक समाजकार्य भाग-२) B.A. in Social Work Part-II Examination Rs. 67/-
 - (iii) For (वाड्ःमय स्नातक समाजकार्य अंत्य) B.A. in Social Work Final Examination Rs. 67/-

A fee of Rs. 5/- per subject shall be payable in addition to the above fees in respect of a subject in which practical examination is prescribed.

- Without prejudice to the other provisions of Ordinance No.6 relating to the Examinations in General, the provisions of Paragraphs 5,8,10,27, & 32 of said Ordinance shall apply to every Collegiate candidate.
- 12. Every examinee for the (वाड्ःमय स्नातक समाजकार्य भाग-१) B.A. in Social Work Part-I Examination shall be examined in -
 - (i) English
 - (ii) Marathi/Hindi/Supplementary English, or any one of the following Classical Languages -Sanskrit, Persian, Arabic, Pali and Prakrit or Latin
 - (iii) Sociology.
 - (iv) Psychology (General and Social)
 - (v) Elements of Social Work, and
 - (vi) Field work

Provided that a student whose mother tongue is neither Marathi nor Hindi may offer Supplementary English in lieu of Marathi or Hindi.

- 13. Every Examinee for the (वाड्ःमय स्नातक समाजकार्य भाग-२) B.A. in Social Work Part-II Examination shall be examined in..
 - (i) English,
 - (ii) Marathi/Hindi/Supplementary English or any one of the following classical languages.
 Sanskrit, Persian, Arabic, Pali and Prakrit or Latin.
 - (iii) Sociology
 - (iv) Psychology and Development and Adjustment
 - (v) Methods and Techniques of Social Work.
 - (vi) Fields of Social Work Paper-I
 - (vii) Field Work.

Provided that a student whose mother tongue is neither Marathi nor Hindi may offer Supplementary English in lieu of Marathi or Hindi.

- 14. Every examinee for (वाड्ःमय स्नातक समाजकार्य अंत्य) B.A. in Social Work Final Examination shall be examined in:-
 - (i) Sociology
 - (ii) Indian Economics
 - (iii) Social Welfare Administration and Methods of Social Investigations.
 - (iv) Fields of Social Work, Paper-II
 - (v) Fields of Social Work, Paper-III,

- (vi) Field Work.
- (vii) General Viva-Voce.
- 15. The scope of the subjects shall be as indicated in the Syllabus.
- 16. In order to pass either the (वाङ्:मय स्नातक समाजकार्य भाग-१, २ किंवा अंत्य) B.A. in Social Work Part-I,Part-II or Final Examination, an examinee must obtain the minimum marks as shown in Appendices 'A', 'B' & 'C' respectively. An examinee shall obtain the minimum pass marks separately in the Theory Examination and Practical Examination, wherever prescribed.
- 17. Successful examinees securing not less than 60% marks in the aggregate prescribed for the (वाड्:मय स्नातक समाजकार्य भाग-१, २ किंवा अंत्य) B.A. in Social Work Part- I, Part-II and Final Examination taken together shall be placed in the First Division, those securing less than 60% but not less than 45% in the Second Division, and all other successful examinees in the Third Division.
- 18. A successful examinee obtaining not less than 75% of marks obtainable in a subject at the (वाड्:मय रनातक - समाजकार्य भाग-१, २ किंवा अंत्य) B.A. in Social Work. Part- I, Part-II and Final Examinations shall be declared to have passed the examination with Distinction in that subject.
- 19. The provision of Ordinance 18 of 2001 relating to the Condonation of Deficiency of Marks for passing an Examination and of Ordinance No.10 relating to Exemptions and Compartments shall apply to the examinations under this Direction.
- 20. There shall be no classification of examinees successful at the (वाड्ःमय रनातक - समाजकार्य भाग- १ किंवा २) B.A. in Social Work Part-I or II Examination.
- 21. As soon as possible after the examination, but not later than the 30th June next following, in case of the examinations held in March-April and 28th February next following in case of the examinations held in October-November, the Executive Council shall publish a list of successful examinees of the (वाड्:मय स्नातक समाजकार्य भाग-१,२ व अंत्य) B.A. in Social Work Part-I, B.A. in Social Work .Part-II and the B.A. in Social Work Final Examinations, mentioning the Division obtained in the (वाड्:मय स्नातक समाजकार्य) B.A. in Social Work Final Examinations, mentioning the Division obtained in the (वाड्:मय स्नातक समाजकार्य) B.A. in Social Work Examination as a whole. The names of the examinees passing the examination as a whole, in the minimum prescribed period and obtaining the prescribed number of places in the First or Second Division shall be arranged in Order of Merit as provided in the Examinations in General Ordinance No.6.

- 22. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Ordinance, no person shall be admitted to this examination, if he has already passed this examination or an examination of any other Statutory University.
- 23. An Examinee successful at the (वाड्ःमय स्नातक समाजकार्य भाग-१ किंवा २) B.A. in Social Work Part-I or II Examination shall be entitled to receive a Certificate signed by the Registrar, and on successful at the (समाजकार्य स्नातक अंत्य) B.S.W. Final Examination shall on payment of the prescribed fees be awarded a Degree in the prescribed form, signed by the Vice- Chancellor.

Examination in Environmental Studies leading to Bachelor Degree, Ordinance, 2005

Whereas it is expedient to frame an Ordinance relating to Examination in Environmental Studies leading to Bachelor Degree level, hereinafter appearing, the Management Council is hereby pleased to make the following Ordinance.

- 1. This Ordinance may be called "Examination in Environmental Studies leading to Bachelor Degree, Ordinance, 2005."
- This Ordinance shall come into force from the Academic session 2005-06.
- 3. In this Ordinance and in other ordinances relating to the examination, unless there is anything repugnant in the subject or context :-
 - (i) "Academic session" means a session commencing on such date and ending with such date of the year following as may be appointed by the Management Council.
 - (ii) "Admission to an examination" means the issuance of an admission card to a candidate in token of his having complied with all the conditions laid down in the relevant ordinance, by a competant officer of the University.
 - (iii) "Applicant" means a person who has submitted an application to the University in the form prescribed for admission to an examination.
 - (iv) "Candidate" means a person who has been admitted to an examination by the University.
 - (v) "Regular Candidate" means an applicant who has applied for admission to a University examination through an affiliated college, Department or Institute in which he/she has prosecuting a regular course of study.
 - (vi) "Examinee" means a person who present himself/herself for an examination to which he/she has been admitted.
 - (vii) "Examination" means an examination prescribed by the University under the relevant Ordinance.
 - (viii) "External Candidate" means a candidate who is allowed to take a University examination in accordance with the provision of Original Ordinance No. 151.

- (ix) "Non-Collegiate Candidate" means a candidate who is not a collegiate candidate.
- (x) An "Ex-student" is a person who having once been admitted to an examination of this University, is again required to take the same examination by reason of his failure or absence thereat and shall include a student who may have joined a college, Department or Institute again in the same class.
- (xi) "Bachelor Degree Examination" means a examination leading to Bachelor Degree of the University.
- (xii) "Previous Year" means a year following by final year of Bachelor Degree.
- 4. Save as otherwise specifically provided, the conditions prescribed for admission to the examination under this Ordinance shall apply to all persons who wish to take the examination to the Degrees of the University mentioned in para 5 below.
- 5. The conditions prescribed for admission to examination under this Ordinance shall apply to following degrees of the University :-

 - 3) Bachelor of Fine Arts

 - 9) Bachelor of Computer Science
 - 10) Bachelor of Computer Applications
 - 11) Bachelor of Pharmacy
 - 12) Bachelor of Science (Home Science)
 - 13) Bachelor of Technology (Cosmetics)
 - 14) Bachelor of Engineering
 - 15) Bachelor of Engineering (Part Time) (Civil)
 - 16) Bachelor of Textile

 - 2) Bachelor of Textile
 - 3) Bachelor of Technology (Chemical Technology)
 - 4) Bachelor of Technology (Chemical Engineering)
 - 5) Bachelor of Architecture, and
 - iii) Environmental Studies shall be a compulsory subject for Vth & VIth Semester of the Degree of Bachelor of Laws (Five Year Course)
- 7. Examination leading to Environmental Studies at above mentioned Bachelor Degree courses shall be held once in Academic session i.e. in Summer only, at such places and on such date as may be appointed by the Board of Examinations.

Explanation :- Examination to be held in Summer shall be conducted on the basis of one common question paper for all Bachelor Degree courses irrespective of annual or semester pattern.

- 8. Scope of the subject for annual pattern examination and or semester pattern examination shall be as provided under the syllabus.
- 9. Common question paper for all courses covered under this Ordinance alongwith answer books shall be supplied by the University to the Colleges, Departments and Institutes for conducting the examination of the subject.

 Valuation of the answer books relating to this subject shall be done at College/Department/Institution level only. Remuneration for valuation of answer books shall not be paid by the University.
 Provided that prescribed evaluation fee for evaluation of each answer

book/s of an external examinee/s appeared from the examination centre shall be paid to each examination centre.

11. It shall be obligatory on the part of the College/Department/Institute to submit candidate wise following information to the University on or before the date as may be prescribed by the University :-

- 12. For the purposes of teaching, learing and examination, the Committee consisting of three teachers shall be appointed by the Principal/ Head of the Department/Head of the Institution under his/her Chairmanship/ Chairpersonship. While appointing three teachers on the said committee, the Principal shall take care that the teachers to be appointed on the committee, if necessary, shall be from different faculty.
- 13. i) Duration of theory examination of this subject shall be three hour.
 - ii) For all Bachelor Degree examinations, common question paper of 100 marks shall be provided by the University.
 - iii) Distribution of these 100 marks shall be as follows :-

a) Part-A, Short Answer Pattern	-	25 Marks
b) Part-B, Essay type with inbuilt choice	-	50 Marks
c) Part-C, Essay on Field Work	-	25 Marks

- 14. Medium of instruction shall be English or Marathi or Hindi. Question paper shall be supplied in English and Marathi and Hindi. A candidate shall have option to write answers in English or Marathi or Hindi.
- 15. Examination of this subject shall be compulsory for external candidate also.
- 16. For teaching of the subject, there shall be atleast two hour per week. For teaching the subject to the regular candidates, a full time approved teacher of the University and or a person having Postgraduate Degree in any faculty with second class shall be considered elligible.

- 17. For teaching of the subject, additional fee to be charged to regular candidate shall be as prescribed by the University.
- 18. Evary College /University Teaching Department shall charge additional fee of Rs. 100/- to every student of the subject Environmental Studies ot of this Rs. 100/-, the College/University Teaching Department shall have to pay Rs. 25/- to the University as an Examination fee of each candidate for the subject Environmental Studies.
- 19. The Grade secured by an examinee in the examination of this subject shall not be considered for providing the facility of A.T.K.T. in next higher class.
- 20. The provisions of Ordinance No. 18/2001 shall not be applicable for securing a grade or higher grade in the examination of this subject.
- 21. Result of the Final Year of the respective Degree shall not be declared of an examinee unless he/she secures any one of the grade in the examination of subject.

Provided an examinee admitted to Five Year LL.B. course desiring not to continue his/her education beyond Sixth Semester of the said course shall have to secure any one of the grade in the examination of the subject otherwise his/her result of Sixth Semester for awarding B.A. degree shall not be declared.

22. Grade secured by an examinee in the examination of the subject shall be shown in the statement of marks of Final Year/Last Semester examination.
