1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Feedback from the students is taken in the form of print through structured questionnaire at the end of each semester and informally utilized for upgradation quality of education standards. To ensure free and frank feedback students are not to disclose their identity and the feedback for particular course is collected by a faculty. The feedback obtained is analysed by Head of the department and the appropriate steps are taken for the overall development. The feedback obtained is analysed and utilised in the following manner: 1. The feedback from students is taken at the end of academic session. Meanwhile faculty members of the department take feedback on academic issues in the classroom interaction and issues are solved at their own level. For weaker students the department has mechanism of remedial coaching. If students demand the remedial coaching the Head of the Department consider it and arranges the special classes. For advanced learners the department has the scheme of Net Coaching Classes. The advance learners are motivated for the activities like research paper presentation, poem writing, story writing, essay writing, elocution and debate, participation in Research Festivals, Innovation

competitions etc. The faculty members always provide the academic resources such as text and reference books, research articles, extra reading material and short notes etc. to the students. 2. The feedback on curriculum is also taken and the issues observed are communicated to the authorities like members of the Board of studies. 3. The feedback on teaching is considered by HOD for the further improvement and proper instructions are given to faculty members if found any issues. 4. The feedback from teachers are analysed and proper steps are taken for the overall development. 5. The feedback on curriculum is also taken from Alumni of the department and important recommendation is communicated to the authorities such as members of the Board of studies. 6. The feedback from teachers are regularly taken and proper steps are taken for the overall development. 7. Parent's feedback is taken during parent meet and department take care to satisfy them for wellbeing of their wards.

Teaching and Learning	The teaching-learning activities are modified changed and more student centric and employment oriented with every passing day. It has also made sure that learning process for the students must attractive and fruitful in the present as well as in future. Students are provide with study material as ready reckoner. University has started providing e-content of the study material and various possible things. At regular intervals, all the departments of the university conduct workshops, seminars, presentations to improve the soft skills among students. Soft skills development programmers through Life Coping Skills Centre are arranged to look the need of the hour. Assignments, field project are given to students. Apart from the regular activities motivational sessions and counselling sessions are conducted to boost the morale of the students and the faculty. Coaching facility for various competitive examinations is provided by the experts of that field. Additional facilities like pre-exam training, remedial classes, extra classes, FAQ sessions are provided by the university.
Curriculum Development	University has imparted different topics additional to the syllabus. This will help students to broaden their area of knowledge and enhance their skills. Major focus was given on the

practical applicability of the concepts and topics. Technical courses provided are updated to facilitate the students and to benefit them from the Placement point of view. University has introduced Credit based Grade Point Scaling. Credit and grades are assigned to students on a 10-point scale. Teaching pedagogy has shifted from conventional mode to non-conventional mode. University has increased the use of Information and communication technology in the teaching-learning process. The use of ICT based teaching has increased keeping in mind the current scenario of the whole world. The availability of Virtual C4 has benefited a lot. Teaching can be done via synchronous and asynchronous way with the help of Virtual C4.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best Practice : (2018 - 19) 1. Title of the Practice: Rainwater harvesting of the University Campus Goals: • Creating for the University community an ambience and learning environment that advances a civil and sustainable society. • Ensuring the conservation of biological diversity and the protection of this eco-sensitive area by adopting sound and sustainable development. • Encouraging the University community to pilot and promote sustainable solutions through teaching, research and extension activities that tackle live issues of the campus and its adjacent communities. • Promoting and protecting the natural and semi natural habitats of existing species in the campus to ensure their survival and growth. 2. The Context: • Accessibility: The lush green plantation surrounded by hilly terrain of the campus has helped in creating spaces for academic, residential and recreational areas that blended in with the landscape while also being accessible and eco-friendly. • Water Resources Management: Sustainable water resource management practices need to be addressed to make the campus environmentally sustainable, like judicious water consumption, water sources, appliances, wastages etc. Leakages and overflow of water from overhead tanks were identified. Waste management and disposal pose a challenge at the implementation level. To motivate students in large numbers to cultivate the social and environmental attitude is a huge responsibility. Green initiatives taken up by the institution will benefit the campus through reduced resources consumption and waste diversion. • Management of wildlife in the campus: the campus is home to a number of barking monkeys, several varieties of snakes including the gliding viper, several varieties of birds (parrots, herons, wood pigeons, among the few), hordes of wild bees and a bevy of wild leopards. • Security issues: A campus covering 470 acres with a lot of dense forest cover called for an effective yet unobtrusive security plan. 3. The Practice: The uniqueness of SGB Amravati University Campus is that it demonstrates respect for environment and stewardship of natural resources while ensuring the quality of life in the campus. The master plan of the university has been designed to ensure and sustain a harmonious blend of human and environmental well being. The university has undertaken various initiatives to setting up an Eco-friendly campus. In its endeavour for conservation of healthy ecosystems, the University has embarked on a plantation drive spread over 470 acres of its campus. The variegated cropping of neem, bamboo, papal, gulmohar have been established as livelihood projects within the scope of demonstration farms and seed gardens to demonstrate and promote scientific research in crop development and intercropping. Once they start yielding, the university will promote such plantations in the villages and facilitate farmers. The University has started roof top solar installations at the campus with an installed capacity of 580 KW. A MOU has also been signed with Solar Corporations Energy of India, New Delhi to set up a solar farm in the campus to generate I Megawatt of electricity for domestic consumption and to feed the surplus to the national grid. The University has invested enormous resources to ensure sustainable waater management and use. It has created a major reservoir, spread over 10 Acres, with an average depth of 30 feet, by tapping a small stream passing through the campus and the many natural springs in the adjoining creeks. It has created one minor reservoir of an acre or more in area and 15 to 20 feet in depth, by creating bandhs around existing permanent springs. 4. Evidence of success: Success of creation of an eco-friendly University Campus is seen in the following: o A very hilly terrain has been tackled for the plantation mentioned above, and great care if taken for their systematic maintenance and robust growth. o Whatever plants have been destroyed by urbanisation have been

promptly replaced. o Research is being done by several students in the areas of

tissue-culture, pest resistance, seed production and medical properties. • Grid connected roof top solar photo voltaic power project: o The 580 KW project is operational at the campus. o Waste management • Water Conservation and supply management • Wildlife management 5. Problems encountered and resources required: • While the opportunities to explore eco-friendly possibilities are evident, actions devoted to conservation for a green campus are expensive. • Building of bandhs and check dams need expert advice and investment of resources. But once created, they have greatly reduced the destructive power of flooding and storm water surges. They have also created welcome spaces for relaxation and sports for campus community. • Selection and preparation for locations for academic and residential buildings call for expertise in soil erosion management, drainage, placement of retaining walls and plans for proper landscaping. Though such attention to detail cost a lot of resources, the net result has been buildings that blend into the landscape and a network of drains and walls that effectively control erosion. • Systematic planning of trees, bushes and vertiver grass to stabilise slopes and embankments were expensive but fruitful. Best Practices: (2018-19) 1. Title: Reading Club - The Book I have Read 2. Objectives: To enhance critical skills and foster enjoyment of literature 3. The Context - Owing to too much focus on the examination related study, students often miss out the importance and opportunity of reading for deeper understanding and appreciation of great pieces of literature not just in English but other Indian Literature. As such, a platform is very much needed which would foster their reading, comprehension, and critical skills. 4. The Practice -- its Uniqueness, Limitations: A group of interested candidates is formed who are ready to read and discuss in detail the book of they have read. There is no binding on the medium of expression. Students are free to choose the language of their choice and the book of their interest and taste. Every fortnight a meeting is arranged wherein two readers would talk on the reading of the book they have done. The participants are required to give in advance their name and topic for their address. Even students and teachers from other departments and colleges are permitted to attend and participate in the discussion if they want to. This reading club activity has not been found to be common or routine practice in many departments and affiliated colleges and therefore seldom organised. Hence, the practice has become unique in its own way. It is seen that students coming from rural background and with low confidence level and lack of sufficient mastery fluency in language often hesitate to come forward and make a presentation despite having deep interest in language literature and those who have cultivated reading as their hobby. 5. Evidence of success: In the beginning few students came forward to make presentations and participate in discussions but over the time there has been gradual increase in their number. 6. Problems Encountered: Owing to examination pressure, students generally have a tendency to avoid participation in other extra-curricular activities and develop insular attitude.

Loksant Shri Gadge Baba, great visionary, devoted his entire life for gram swachhata, social awareness and education. As a sense of gratitude towards his great contribution for social upliftment, our university is named after Sant Gadge Baba. He is a perennial source of inspiration to this University. Ten commandments of Sant Gadge Baba serves as an inspiration and basis on which Sant Gadge Baba Amravati university has been continuously working for the

community. Vision and mission of this University is based on Ten Commandments given by Sant Gadge Baba for elevation of the society. This is the distinctiveness of the university. The issue of Kumari Mata (Unmarried Mothers) inYavatmal district testifies to the sexual exploitation of tribal women by nontribal men and subsequent stigmatization and exclusion within village society and tribal community. The University is working determinedly inYavatmal district to adopt preventive and rehabilitative measures for KumariMatas (Unmarried Mothers). University has been continuously engaged in organizing programmes for tribal girls in Yavatmal district. These programmes are organised through National Service Scheme of the University by various affiliated collages in the region. Affiliated colleges of the university involved in this venture are Shri GajananMaharaj Arts and Commerce College, Mukutban, NurjahaBegam Salam Ahmad Arts and Commerce College Wani,ShriBabasahebDeshmukhParvekar College , Pandharkawda, ShivramjiMoghe Arts Commerce and Science College Kelapur and Rajiv Science and Commerce College Zari. Six hundred eighty four tribal girls have been instructed about preventive measures to be taken against sexual exploitation. Women Study Centre of University completed one Project titled "Problems of KumariMatas in Yavatmal district sponsored by State Women Commission, Mumbai. The objectives of the project are to study background of KumariMatas, to identify various factors behind the problems of Kumara Matas and to suggest preventive measures for solving their problems. In this project 52 KumariMatas are randomly selected and studied. Observations are as follows- 28.84 kumara Matas are in the age range of 26 to 30 years, 36 KumariMatas having education up to Fourth standard, 67.30 KumariMatas are belonging to 'kolam' caste, 82.69 are homeless, 51.09 are pregnant due to outsiders, 82.07 children of KumariMatas are admitted in the school by furnishing the name of mother only, 92.30 had delivery at home,61.63 getting help from government schemes. Our University has adopted five villages from each district under it to support "Clean India Campaign". University is working hard to face the challenges before us that and to convert villages into Adarsha Gram (Ideal Villages). University stands committed to intervene strongly in the local region i.e adopted villages by implementing various programmes for social, economic development. Activities undertaken in the adopted villages taking forward the vision of the university in these adopted villages are health awareness camps, awareness programmes on solid waste management, women entrepreneurship programmes, tree plantation programme, demonstration on soak pit preparation and kitchen gardening training programme.
